Encampment Information

1. Briefly describe the characteristics of the people residing within the prioritized encampment site. The description must include demographics and may include household compositions, disabilities, and projected service and housing needs. (1500 character limit)

The people who reside at the prioritized encampment reflect diverse backgrounds, ethnicities, and physical abilities. Some are justice-involved, have employment history, or are veterans. Many have reported disabling conditions and/or behavioral health needs. There are no minor children; there are two couples. Ethnicities include Native American, Hispanic, and Caucasian. Those residing at the encampment are

often transient, hospitalized, incarcerated, or ill; the number of residents varies based on this and seasonal weather and temperatures. Regular outreach efforts have served to build rapport with many of the residents. Some residents have received Behavioral Health/or substance use disorder services as part of ongoing outreach and engagement efforts. All current encampment residents are experiencing chronic homelessness and would benefit from responsive efforts this funding would enable. Projected service needs include stabilization by connecting residents to voluntary services, such as behavioral health services, medical care and treatment, harm reduction, and crisis and domestic violence services. Adequate storage to support transition to shelter/housing would be offered. Projected housing needs include low-barrier, dignified interim housing options, housing navigation support, and permanent housing. Once housed, services such as tenant advocacy, transition support, tenancy and life skills development, and rental assistance funds would promote stability and success.

2. Briefly describe physical characteristics of the prioritized encampment site in which the people you are proposing to serve are residing. The description must include the specific location, physical size of the area, the types of structures people are residing in at the site, whether vehicles are present, and any other relevant or notable physical characteristics of the site. (1000 character limit)

The prioritized encampment site is located in the rural town of Mariposa on open land at Frank Wilson Drive, with no assigned address. The encampment borders 3 properties; the majority falls on county-owned property which has been temporarily fenced in part. The site is adjacent to CA HWY 49 N and spans just under 1 acre. There is sloping, uneven terrain with native plants and grasses that pose fire risk. There are several aged oak trees that pose risk of fire and falling into the site. There are seasonal streams that pose contamination risk to wildlife and residents. There are makeshift shelters and structures made of pallets, tarps, plastics, metal, and blankets and several worn and weathered tents. 5 non-operational vehicles are present. The county has provided a portable toilet, handwashing station, and dumpster for weekly collection of refuse. There are large piles of trash and debris throughout the encampment; this is visible for all who travel HWY 49 N to visit Yosemite.

3. Why is this particular encampment site being prioritized? (1000 character limit)

The prioritized encampment site, known as the Frank Wilson encampment, has existed since 2019. The location served as an emergency shelter site prior to the opening of our local emergency shelter. This encampment is being prioritized due to the public health and safety hazards for those who live there, and for those who reside near, or are frequently in the vicinity of the encampment. Risks and safety concerns have escalated in the last several months; in Fall 2022, a large methamphetamine bust occurred, a large fire started, and there was a shooting that resulted in the death of one individual. There is significant impact to the native environment due to biohazards and debris. The encampment is at the top of a hill and poses risk of materials or carts rolling down into the highway. Residents leaving the camp on foot must travel on the shoulder of the highway to reach town and most destinations; encampment residents who walk into the highway pose a risk for motorists and themselves.

Proposal's Outcomes

5. What are the outcomes this proposal seeks to accomplish by the grant close (6/30/2026)? If

funded, what are the primary activities you are planning to implement to achieve the proposal's outcomes? (1000 character limit)

Proposal outcomes include the cleaning and clearing of the prioritized encampment site, increasing infrastructure and capacity at our emergency homeless shelter, and securing permanent housing pathways and supports for those residing in the encampment. If funded, primary activities would include collaboration with key partners to carefully coordinate all logistics related to the cleaning and clearing of the site, and the subsequent transition of encampment residents and their pets. Multidisciplinary teams would support outreach, transition preparedness, voluntary service delivery, and coordinated transition. Transition activities would occur after installation of storage and 15 low-barrier interim emergency shelter units at the homeless shelter. Client-centered activities include individual case management, housing navigation, and essential services to transition encampment residents from the shelter into permanent housing and intensive case management to successfully maintain housing.

6. How will the applicant measure progress towards the proposal's outcomes? (1000 character limit)

Progress towards this proposal's outcomes will be measured by the prevention of an encampment being re-established at the prioritized site once cleared; progress will also be measured based on increased emergency shelter capacity, and the number of people who successfully relocate from the encampment into emergency temporary shelter. Progress will be further measured by the number of people who agree to receive housing support services, beginning a pathway to permanent housing. We will also measure progress based on the number of people who achieve and maintain permanent housing and who do not return to homelessness within the grant period. Service capacity will also be measured through the expansion of programming based on the grant.

7. Are there any local ordinances, resources, or other factors that may hinder achieving the proposal's outcomes? If so, how will the applicant navigate these challenges? (1000 character limit)

Mariposa County HHSA has a strong, collaborative relationship with county and community partners that is driven by a shared System of Care.

There are no known local ordinances, resources, or other factors that may hinder achieving the proposal's outcomes. Should any challenges arise in the course of implementation, effective and efficient solutions will be employed by collaborating with the appropriate partners, to include Caltrans, Central Sierra Continuum of Care, Connections Emergency Shelter, the Alliance for Community Transformations, Probation, Anthem, and other partners. HHSA is committed to successfully navigating any challenges that arise in support of the goals of this proposal. This proposal has also taken into account voice and choice of the individuals currently residing in the encampment, and seeks to respond through the provision of voluntary services that are meaningful and relevant for this group of individuals.

This proposal aligns with several current initiatives. These include the Central Sierra Continuum of Care goals for preventing and eliminating homelessness; housing navigation and tenancy goals within the California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal initiative; and elements within the 2021 Mariposa County Homelessness Strategic Plan. This proposal aligns with HHSA's vision of a healthy, safe, and thriving community, reinforced through our shared collaborative System of Care (SOC), which includes HHSA and several community partners and stakeholders. SOC is driven by individual voice and choice, and considers a holistic, trauma-informed approach in connecting individuals to supportive services and programs. Case management and support will also draw from the US Interagency Council on Homelessness principles for

addressing encampments, and from the model applied for HHSA's NPLH clients which has resulted 100% success for 11 formerly homeless clients, now housed over 8 months.				

Part 3: IMPLEMENTATION

Core Service Delivery and Housing Strategies

9. Describe the proposed outreach and engagement strategy, case management, and / or service coordination for people while they are continuing to reside within the encampment site. Quantify units of service to be delivered including the ratio of staff to people served, frequency of engagement, and length of service periods. (2000 character limit)

The outreach and engagement strategy for people while they continue to reside in the encampment will be developed based on continued engagement of encampment residents, so that solutions are shared and reflective of resident needs. Outreach and engagement will include supportive case management that is person-centered and trauma-informed, and that seeks to provide a direct connection to essential care or services. Outreach, engagement, and service coordination will be driven by multidisciplinary teams, and will build on existing regular weekly outreach efforts that are currently in place. Encampment residents will be paired with a case manager who will serve as their point of contact and support throughout the encampment resolution process, and who will serve to connect them to partner organizations for voluntary coordinated services. Outreach efforts will also support encampment residents by assisting them with Medi-Cal applications and Social Security disability applications in order to help promote health outcomes and adequately address needs related to improving individual social determinants of health. Service delivery ratios will vary based on voluntary service needs and may look like 1:3 based on 15 residents. Engagement will continue weekly or as required based on individual needs prior to the closure of the encampment. The clearing and closing of the encampment will not occur until after multiple outreach events and ample notice have occurred, and not before alternative shelter, housing, and service needs are fully in place. Individual immediate needs will be addressed and prioritized, and coordination with a broad network of programs and services will occur. Length of service period is anticipated to continue past the grant close of 6/30/26 for any formerly homeless encampment resident who, once housed, would benefit from ongoing support to successfully maintain their housing.

10. Describe the role of Coordinated Entry in the context of this proposal and how Coordinated Entry policies or processes will support and / or hinder the implementation of this proposal. (1000 character limit)

In collaboration with the Central Sierra Continuum of Care and their contracted administrative entity, Amador Tuolumne Community Action Agency, Mariposa County HHSA will utilize our area Coordinated Entry System to support efforts to provide services for individuals who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. The four core components of access, assessment, prioritization, and referral will be implemented as a part of entry into the Homeless Services System of Care and flow of services. This process will help to identify those in our prioritized encampment who may have the highest vulnerabilities or needs when considering both options for interim emergency shelter and pathways to permanent housing solutions.

11. Please describe the interim shelter and permanent housing opportunities proposed to support this proposal and provide evidence of the applicant's demonstrated ability and commitment to deliver permanent housing for people residing in the prioritized encampment. (2000 character limit)

The interim shelter opportunities proposed to support this proposal would consist of 15 interim shelter units, which would significantly expand capacity at our emergency homeless shelter, and would be sufficient to temporarily house each of the prioritized encampment residents. Each unit would accommodate 1-2 persons from the prioritized encampment and would offer a safe, secure, dignified interim solution. This would increase capacity at the shelter which is essential to the success of this proposal, and would offer stability while addressing the basic need of shelter. Once in transitional shelter, encampment residents would be prepared to begin housing navigation services and access pathways to permanent housing. Permanent housing opportunities proposed to support this proposal would include a range of permanent, affordable housing options as identified through housing navigation and supported by

the key elements of a Housing First approach. Close coordination with key partners, such as our regional Continuum of Care, would be essential. Mariposa County HHSA has demonstrated success in our ability and commitment to deliver permanent housing. Mariposa HHSA has delivered consistent supportive efforts for 11 individuals housed in July of 2022 at Creekside Terrace, through No Place Like Home (NPLH) program funds. Staff have coordinated regular home visits and ongoing opportunities to support all residents in effectively maintaining their housing. We have a 100% success rate as of the time of this application; all 11 persons housed have successfully maintained their housing since entering into housing over 8 months ago. 5 of these residents moved directly from an encampment, and 3 moved directly from our emergency shelter. All 11 were previously chronically homeless. HHSA would apply the same efforts and model that has promoted success for these individuals in delivering permanent housing for people residing within the prioritized encampment.

12. Describe how this proposal is tailored to meet the needs and preferences of people residing within the prioritized encampment. (1500 character limit)

This proposal is tailored to meet the needs and preferences of people residing within the prioritized encampment based on our System of Care approach, which values the Client's voice and choice. Through regular outreach efforts, HHSA and partner staff have identified the needs and preferences of many residing within the encampment. This proposal has been developed to advocate and respond to the needs identified; the short-term goal of immediate temporary shelter, and the long-term goal of stable housing. Many residents within the encampment have expressed that they would like a safe place of their own to call home, such as a 'tiny home'. Stable shelter that provides individual safety and dignity will serve as an essential first step to securing the goal of permanent housing. Many encampment residents have pets; the emergency shelter is able to accept pets, which alleviates a significant barrier for many within the encampment. Many encampment residents report lost, stolen, or damaged items; with the addition of a large storage unit at the emergency shelter site, resident belongings will be secured and accessible. Shelter serves as an effective solution to promote health and wellness. Many encampment residents have disclosed medical conditions, some of which may be potentially treated with preventive care, alleviating pain and discomfort and improving health and wellbeing. The ultimate preventative care is to provide our encampment residents with a stable housing environment.

13. Describe how this proposal considers and plans for the dynamic nature of encampments including potential inflow of people into the geographically served areas. (1000 character limit)

This proposal considers and plans for the dynamic nature of encampments, including potential inflow of additional residents into the prioritized encampment area, by considering local data and information known to HHSA and key partners regarding our community of persons who are homeless. Average shelter stay data and current capacity has been examined, and HHSA data on the number of persons in the prioritized encampment based on regular outreach events has been considered. The number of individuals that will be served as part of this proposal is reflective of this information; it is also anticipated that as those in the

emergency shelter transition to permanent housing options, there will be ongoing/additional emergency shelter capacity through increasing infrastructure that may serve others within this grant period.

14. Describe how this proposal will support individuals with continued access to and / or the storage of their personal property. (1000 character limit)

This proposal seeks to install a large storage unit at the emergency homeless shelter site, which will be secured and accessible for residents who transition from the encampment to newly installed temporary shelter units. In addition to the storage unit, this proposal requests two large personal storage bins for each current encampment resident, that can be securely filled with an individual's belongings and placed within the storage unit on site. For those who may transition from the prioritized encampment site directly to housing, any storage needs will be addressed, and resources made available as possible through the multidisciplinary team.

15. Describe how this proposal will support individuals with service animals and/or pets. (1000 character limit)

This proposal supports individuals with service animals and/or pets through collaboration with the emergency shelter. The shelter is able to accept service animals and pets and has special program funding to support the animals. The goal of the Pet Assistance and Service (PAS) program is to remove barriers that make it difficult for a person to obtain the services needed to return to stable housing. Persons who enter the emergency shelter with pets will have veterinary care provided for their animals at no-cost, and are provided with outside secured kennels, inside crates for overnight sleeping next to their family member. The shelter will also provide pet food, veterinary care to obtain the proper and required pet vaccinations and spay or neuter services. The shelter will also provide pet behavior modification training, and leashes and collars. Another goal of the PAS program is to remove the barriers that make it difficult for a person to seek or accept temporary shelter.

Budget and Resource Plan

18. Identify and describe these non-ERF-2-R resources. (1000 character limit)

Non ERF-2-R resources will include Social Services Realignment funding (approximately \$250,000 per year) used to support partial operating costs for Connections Emergency Shelter; funding such as the California Emergency Solutions and Housing Program (CESH) (approximately \$5,000) and Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds (approximately \$100,000). Personnel costs leveraged will exceed \$300,000 throughout the project. Other leveraged funding amounts will vary based on individual eligibility and will include funding from sources such as the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA), Home Safe, and the Housing and Disability Advocacy Program (HDAP). Other leveraged funding is projected based on current fiscal year funding. It is also anticipated that Medi-Cal funds will support essential health-related needs and services for persons served by this proposal, especially as related to CalAIM and Community Supports (CS). Finally, the Pet Assistance and Service (PAS) Grant is about \$74,000.

Describe how the proposal is a prudent and effective use of requested funding relative to the number of people it seeks to serve and the types of services and housing to be provided in the proposal. Include an explanation of how the requested ERF-2-R amount was determined. (1000 character limit)

This funding will serve as a catalyst to put effective, efficient solutions in place that will make a meaningful difference in our community and especially for those experiencing homelessness in the prioritized encampment. The proposal is a prudent and effective use of funding as when leveraged with other funding as described, will support an increase in available dignified shelter, expansion of programmatic support, and improved outcomes for those who are experiencing homelessness in the prioritized encampment site.

Key Entities and Staff

(1500 character limit) The implementing organization is the Mariposa County Health and Human Services Agency; the Administrative Division and Housing and Homelessness Team would administer ERF-2-R. Our agency is consolidated and works effectively to leverage resources and support across teams as driven by a System of Care (SOC), HHSA would lead collaborative efforts to coordinate proposal tasks and service delivery toward progress and milestones as outlined in the timeline. Leadership within the organization has effectively managed housing and homelessness programs, and have successfully led staff in achieving positive outcomes for those served. HHSA has drawn from experiences in managing grants in support of housing and homelessness efforts such as the No Place Like Home program, Bringing Families Home program, Community Development Block Grant funds, the Home Safe program, the California Emergency Housing and Solutions program, and the Housing and Disability Advocacy Program. The case management approach included in this proposal has been especially informed by No Place Like Home efforts, which have resulted in successfully housing formerly homeless persons in our community. The proposal also acknowledges the importance of the SOC approach, collaboration and coordinated efforts that have been applied to previous joint projects and programs to achieve success in the intended outcomes of this proposal.

21. First, describe key partners that will collectively pursue the proposal's outcomes. Then, describe their role and primary responsibilities for this proposal. Finally, if these entities have managed a complex homelessness project or grant, describe how those experiences informed this proposal. (1500 character limit)

Collaboration with HHSA will involve Mariposa County Probation, the Central Sierra Continuum of Care, Anthem Medi-Cal, the Alliance for Community Transformations, and staff with the Connections Emergency Shelter. Response will be meaningfully coordinated as to maximize resources and impacts across our coordinated team. Caltrans would also be a key collaborator in this proposal, supporting cleaning and clearing of the encampment site. Probation will provide law enforcement support and presence for justice-involved persons throughout the transition and as part of the multidisciplinary team. The CSCoC will support with coordinated entry and Anthem will support with Medi-Cal needs and services, as well as leveraging funding in support of those served by Housing Navigation and Community Supports (CS). The Alliance for Community Transformations, which operates Connections Emergency Shelter, has successfully managed the shelter since its opening, as well a Local Indigent Care Needs grant that supports our population of adults who are homeless. The Alliance for Community Transformations and HSHA have long enjoyed a collaborative partnership in working to serve our community of persons who are homeless; these efforts have informed this proposal which seeks to increase shelter capacity and expand services.

22. Describe specific examples of how Local Jurisdiction(s) and the CoC have collaborated on the design and implementation of this proposal. (1000 character limit)

Mariposa HHSA attends CSCoC governing board meetings and committee meetings on a regular basis, and has discussed the ERF-2-R funding opportunity. It was determined that each interested county within the CSCoC would initiate an application on their own with the support and continuous communication of CSCoC. Letters of support have also been provided from local community partners, such as Mariposa County Probation, The Alliance for Community Transformations, and Anthem Medi-Cal (LOS not provided for Anthem due to size constraints within portal).

If they have not committed, please explain how you have or plan to engage with this entity to implement your proposal. Aditionally, describe how you collaborated with Caltrans on your program design, implementation plans, and timeline. (1000 character limit) The prioritized encampment site is located on property that is owned by Mariposa County; it is adjacent to property that is owned by the First Baptist Church of Mariposa, located at 5005 Frank Wilson Road. Notification has been provided to the church of the intent to apply and seek ERF-2-R funds, based on ongoing communication and previous collaborative efforts. HHSA has collaborated with Caltrans on the program design by examining the risks posed by the location of the encampment and for the people who currently reside within the prioritized area. The assigned Caltrans homeless encampment liaison from District 10 has been engaged and seeks to be part of the solution through providing resource information and estimated timelines to clear and clean the encampment, as well as associated costs. The information shared has been essential in developing this proposal.

Centering People

24. How were persons with lived experience meaningfully incorporated into the planning and proposed implementation of this proposal? Please identify whether any perspectives were incorporated from persons that are currently unsheltered and / or formerly or currently residing within the prioritized encampment. (1000 character limit)

This proposal has been developed in part based on the ongoing outreach efforts conducted by HHSA and the Emergency Shelter, with persons who are currently unsheltered in our community. Many of these persons have lived experiences that relate to both experiencing chronic homelessness and residing in an encampment in Mariposa County. The perspectives have been shared with outreach staff based on building trust and rapport with the residents of the encampment. The perspectives shared by the residents have led to the areas of focus described in our proposal's outcomes, including dignified, safe interim shelter; the ability to keep their animals/pets; the ability to securely store personal belongings; and being offered voluntary services based on individual needs that will lead to permanent housing options.

25. Briefly describe how the proposal exemplifies Housing First approaches as defined in Welfare and Institutions Code section 8255. (1000 character limit)

This proposal will be centered on Housing First approaches, as practiced by our low-barrier Emergency Shelter, that promote accepting individuals regardless of their sobriety or use of substances, or participation in services. Participation in services will not be a condition of interim shelter or permanent housing tenancy. Additionally, the Emergency Shelter practices a harm reduction philosophy that recognizes drug and alcohol use and addiction may be part of a person's lives. Those staying at the shelter will be offered nonjudgmental communication regarding drug and alcohol use and education regarding how to avoid risky behaviors and engage in safer practices.

26. Briefly describe how this proposal will center an individual's choice and provide trauma informed services and supports. (1000 character limit)

Our proposal seeks to provide supportive services that emphasize engagement and collaborative problem-solving with the individual served, as well as case management and services that are driven by individual voice and choice. Our shared System of Care (SOC) approach includes trauma-informed response. Through respectful, trauma-informed engagement with the person served, staff will best understand what the client wants and needs, and in what priority order. Staff will respond by offering voluntary supportive services, and by sharing client information as appropriate when making referrals to prevent retraumatization of the client through the need to repeat their story. Voluntary behavioral health services or other supportive services will be made available to support the transition of encampment residents at any time throughout the project, and as a means to successfully maintain permanent housing options.

27. Describe how this proposal will operationalize harm reduction and provide services that improve a person's health, dignity, and safety while they continue to reside within the prioritized encampment site. (1000 character limit)

This proposal will offer interim shelter options to individuals regardless of their sobriety or use of substances, or participation in any related services. Through outreach, persons currently residing at the encampment will be offered nonjudgmental communication on harm reduction, regarding drug and alcohol use and education regarding how to avoid risky behaviors and engage in safer practices. Voluntary service referrals will be offered for any resident who requests these services, or who may benefit from these services based on information shared during outreach efforts.

28. For encamped locations that are objectively dangerous, describe how the proposal will seek to prevent harm for people experiencing unsheltered homelessness in these locations. (1000 character limit)

There are elevated risks and potentially dangerous conditions associated with the prioritized encampment. These include adverse impacts to the health and wellbeing of encampment residents and their animals, and the community overall. There is significant impact to the environment due to biohazards and debris, as well as the risk of extreme weather. Mariposa County has seen significant winter storms to include flooding and heavy snows in the area during the winter season, and this area poses elevated risk of fire for attempting to keep warm, prepare food, or in the summer months when significant amounts of dry, natural vegetation are present. Efforts to mitigate these risks include increased outreach, education, and support as needed. The goal of this proposal will be to move more vulnerable individuals into interim shelter sooner in hopes to decrease risk of potential criminal activity and environmental harm.

29. Identify what controls are or will be in place to ensure that all ERF-2-R funded parties will not penalize homelessness. The term "penalize homelessness" means to impose, by a governmental unit, criminal or civil penalties on persons who are homeless in a manner that is related to those persons' engagement in necessary human activities, including sleeping, resting, and eating. (1000 character limit)

Mariposa County Health and Human Services Agency is not an enforcement agency, and does not penalize those experiencing homelessness. The Mariposa County Board of Supervisors have established a resolution establishing and continuing a shelter crisis local emergency in Mariposa County. This resolution was upheld at the Board meeting held on 12/20/2022. The Board has directed county leadership to collaborate for the purpose of providing solutions for the residents within the encampment, and to provide monthly updates.

30. Describe how this proposal considers sanitation services for people residing in the prioritized encampment. This may include but is not limited to non-intrusive, curb-side waste removal and access to clean and available bathrooms. (1000 character limit)

Mariposa HHSA currently provides a portable toilet, handwashing and sanitation station, and access to a large dumpster that is maintained weekly. HHSA has also supported period clean-up efforts to mitigate health and safety issues for both the people and animals alike that currently reside it the prioritized

encampment area. HHSA has contracted to provide clean-up services and debris removal that is detrimental to the health and wellbeing of both the people and animals that reside in the area of the encampment. This proposal will support ongoing efforts for sanitation services before and during the transition from the encampment to interim shelter by building on the supports that are in place as funded by HHSA.

Accelerated Timeline

31. How is your community currently supporting and / or engaging with people residing within the prioritized encampment? (1000 character limit)

HHSA, Behavioral Health staff, Public Health staff, staff with the Alliance for Community Transformations and Emergency Shelter staff have all completed outreach to the prioritized encampment over the last several months. HHSA staff from the Housing and Homelessness team complete regular outreach to continue to build rapport and relationships with the individuals who reside within the prioritized encampment. Services such as Behavioral Health, AOD or SUD, and vaccination have been offered. Immediate needs related to clothing and food have been met by connecting persons with supportive resources or programs; personal hygiene kits including socks and toiletries have also been delivered. Additionally, the Mariposa County Homeless Task Force committee has met regularly to discuss support and solutions for all who are experiencing homelessness in our community, to include those residing at the prioritized encampment site.

32. If this proposal is selected, in advance of receiving funding, what steps will your community take to support the people living in the encampment and swift implementation of this proposal? (1000 character limit)

HHSA and key project partners have completed regular outreach and/or service delivery to the prioritized encampment site over the last several months, and will continue to do so. The Caltrans Homeless Encampment liaison has visited the prioritized encampment site to determine the scope of work in support of cleaning and clearing the site. HHSA will continue to provide portable toilets, handwashing stations, and a dumpster for weekly refuse collection. Key partners have been identified and are in place to reach the goals of the proposal once funded. Research on options for emergency interim shelter units has been completed, estimates obtained, and requirements for installation have been assessed so that the site can be prepared timely once funding for the interim units has been secured. Outreach staff will continue to engage encampment residents regularly to address their needs and to offer resources and connections to supportive services in advance of potential ERF-2-R funding.

Mariposa County is a gateway to Yosemite National Park which brings vital tourism dollars to local businesses and provides unique recreational experiences for visitors year-round. Wildfires are a constant threat and cooking and warming fires within encampments are of high concern for local officials and community members. Caltrans has worked closely with Mariposa County HHSA and local fire agencies to help mitigate the threat, but more resources are needed to ensure People Experiencing Homelessness (PEH) are provided with housing solutions and not returning to or establishing new encampments along the state right-of-way.

 Provide support and evidence of homeless assistance to show the work that has been done by Mariposa County HHSA and its partners

Caltrans District 10 is currently working with Mariposa County HHSA as it enters acrucial stage of its innovative effort to transition PEH out of encampments and into safe and suitable housing. Providing funding for this program willallow PEH opportunities to transition into a safer environment and eliminate potential health hazards due to exposure to extreme heat, freezing temperatures, heavy rain, and driving snow.

Public Information Officer Rick Estrada is our liaison between Mariposa County HHSA and District 10. By designating a 'point of entry and exit' for information, we increase the program's efficiency for Mariposa County, District 10, and the County's PEH population. District 10 will work with Mariposa County HHSA to ensure that all regulatory and legal requirements of the program are achieved, while providing updates as work proceeds. We will regularly document work so that we can provide a start-to-finishvisual presentation of the fine work our partner performs.

 Explain why funding is necessary for homeless encampments resolution along state highways in Mariposa County and surrounding areas to prevent re-population and address new scattered encampments

Funding is often the missing component for rural counties when addressing needs associated with homeless encampments. Mariposa County has been an historically underserved community when it comes to state funding, placing a heavy strain on local government resources. In an era of equity and social justice, Mariposa County HHSA is a deserving recipient of a Cal-ICH grant – this is the state's opportunity to better serve an often-overlooked, under-funded rural county.

Mariposa County HHSA has the personnel and knowledge to make significant strides in reducing its homeless population and providing resources to helpdiscourage the return of PEH to encampments. While Mariposa County's homeless population pales in the face of large urban communities, the impact of homelessness on underserved counties is greater due to the limited presence of Non-Government Organizations (NGO) and private programs that are more prevalent in urban regions.
