Glenn County Community Action performs street outreach services that consist of personal item distribution and connection to services.

Glenn, Colusa, and Trinity Counties meet quarterly to discuss coordination from a regional perspective and to discuss strategies that are effective around outreach efforts.

**Regional Coordination Narrative - Land Use & Development**

Colusa DHHS is continuously searching for land to develop additional shelter that is much needed in the community. Colusa DHHS is actively searching for available land to develop additional shelter that is much needed in the community. Glenn County is a part of our local Glenn County Housing and Community Development Committee, which meets quarterly to discuss housing solutions, land use, and development plans. In the past few years, we conducted a series of Stakeholders Meetings to identify the priorities and needs for housing in our county. The meetings had participation from the county, the City of Willows, the City of Orland, housing developers, and service providers. We have a list of qualified providers who are ready to take advantage of funding opportunities such as HHAP and PLHA. One of the significant challenges we face in our community is the high infrastructure costs. The available land requires substantial investments in sewer, water, and other related infrastructure, which makes affordable housing development projects less viable. Glenn County is dedicated to investing in permanent housing opportunities that support housing interventions throughout the housing continuum.

Each county in the Dos Rios CoC participates in a separate regional housing authority. Trinity County is part of the Shasta County Housing Authority, Glenn County is part of the Butte County Housing Authority, and Colusa County is part of the Regional Housing Authority of Sutter, Yuba, Colusa, & Nevada Counties.

Colusa DHHS regularly reached out to landlords and property managers to inquire about rental properties and continues to work with landlords to ensure satisfaction with clients housed.

Glenn County Community Action contacted landlords and property managers regarding rental properties and worked with landlords and clients to provide them with affordable permanent housing.

**MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of Understanding stands as evidence that the following parties intend to work together to comply with the actions, roles, and responsibilities described in the Regionally Coordinated Local Homeless Action Plan (Plan). The parties across overlapping jurisdictions, or "Region," include following eligible applicants: the Colusa, Glenn, Trinity Counties Continuum of Care (CoC), Glenn County, Colusa County, and Trinity County (Counties).

Each eligible applicant jurisdictions are represented by the following lead entities:

**Continuum of Care:** Glenn County Community Action Department

**Glenn County:** Glenn County Community Action Department

**Colusa County:** Colusa County Department of Health and Human Services

**Trinity County:** Trinity County Health and Human Services

Each agency agrees to work cooperatively towards the mutual goal of preventing, reducing, and ending homelessness within the Region. This will include the actions, roles, and responsibilities currently identified in the proposed Regional Coordinated Local Homeless Action Plan, incorporated as Attachment A. The parties acknowledge the Plan is subject to further revision and finalization. Any additions or corrections to the Plan as recommended by the California Interagency Council on Homelessness (Cal ICH) shall be incorporated into this MOU and shall serve as the final version of the Plan.

The MOU shall be effective upon the date of last signature and will expire June 30, 2028.

Each party agrees to participate by coordinating/providing the following services:

- 1.0 Commitments to the roles and responsibilities of each party within the region as they pertain to outreach and site coordination, siting and use of available public land, the development of interim and permanent housing options, and coordinating, connecting, and delivering services to individuals experiencing homelessness or at risk of experiencing homelessness, within the region. Commitments to these roles and responsibilities are included in Section 2.1 of Attachment A, the Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan.
- 2.0 Commitments to key actions each party will take to improve system performance measures. Key actions for each system performance measure are included in Section 2.2 in the Attachment A, the Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan.
- 3.0 Commitments to key actions each party will take to ensure racial and gender equity in the in service delivery, housing placements, housing retention, and any other means to affirm equitable access to housing and services for racial and ethnic groups overrepresented among residents experiencing homelessness. Key actions are included in Section 2.3 in the Attachment A, the Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan.

- 4.0 Commitments to key actions each party will take to reduce homelessness among individuals exiting institutional settings including but not limited to jails, prisons, hospitals, and any other institutions such as foster care, behavioral health facilities, etc. as applicable in the region. Key actions are included in Section 2.4 in the Attachment A, the Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan.
- 5.0 Commitments to roles of each party in the utilization of local, state, and federal funding programs to end homelessness. Commitments are included in Section 2.5 in the Attachment A, the Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan
- 6.0 Commitments to roles of each party to connect individuals to wrap-around services from all eligible federal, state and local benefit programs. Commitments are included in Section 2.6 in the Attachment A, the Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan.






