Placer County	<p>Placer County understands the need for both immediate and long-term solutions. We are exploring various interim housing options, such as utilizing existing infrastructure while simultaneously working towards establishing permanent supportive housing developments through community partnerships.</p> <p>Historically, Placer County has demonstrated success with AMIH, and has partnered with this organization on many housing projects in the community, including Timberline (5 permanent supportive housing units), Placer Street (12 permanent supportive housing units), Main Street (19 permanent supportive housing units), and Brown Bear Studios (14 permanent supportive housing units). Most recently, Placer County partnered with AMIH on Sunrose Apartments will provide 82 permanent supportive housing units in Roseville this year.</p>

People with lived experience of homelessness

Individuals with lived experience of homelessness were invited and encouraged to engage in the public stakeholder process through online outreach and collaboration with partner agencies. This included direct engagement through community

organizations serving individuals experiencing homelessness and outreach at shelters and resource centers. Efforts were made to ensure accessibility by hosting public meetings online.

Youth with lived experience of homelessness

The Homeless Resource Council of the Sierras has involved partnerships with youth-serving organizations, schools, and youth housing providers. These agencies are regular attendees to our monthly CoC meetings and provide key input into community efforts, including the HHAP 5 regional plan.

Persons of populations overrepresented in homelessness

HRCS compiled a comprehensive mailing list comprising agencies, organizations, and key community contacts involved in homelessness-related services and advocacy. This list ensured that stakeholders were directly informed about upcoming meetings, initiatives, and opportunities for involvement.

Recognizing the importance of partnerships, the Council actively engages partner service providers in outreach efforts. They encouraged these providers to share information about public meetings and initiatives with their staff and clients, thus expanding the reach of their outreach efforts. By leveraging existing networks and relationships within the community, they facilitated greater awareness and participation among stakeholders who may benefit from or contribute to the Council's work.

Local department leaders and staff from qualifying smaller jurisdictions, including child welfare, health care, behavioral health, justice, and education system leaders

Leaders and staff from local departments relevant to homelessness, including child welfare, health care, behavioral health, justice, and education systems, are invited to participate in the stakeholder process through targeted outreach and coordination with relevant agencies.

To streamline communication and outreach efforts, HRCS employed user-friendly software like Constant Contact. This allows us to send out regular updates, invitations, and announcements regarding public meetings, initiatives, and relevant resources. Through targeted email campaigns, we effectively reached stakeholders and kept them informed about opportunities for engagement with the HHAP 5 process.

Providers of homeless services and housing within the region were actively engaged in the stakeholder process through various means, including provider

forums, workshops, and collaborative working groups. Formal invitations were extended to service providers through professional networks, provider associations, and government agencies responsible for funding and oversight of homeless programs.

**AMENDMENT 1
MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING
BETWEEN
PLACER COUNTY CONTINUUM OF CARE, AND
THE COUNTY OF PLACER
FOR THE PROVISION OF COLLABORATIVE APPLICANT AND LEAD AGENCY
FOR THE HOMELESS HOUSING, ASSISTANCE, AND PREVENTION PROGRAM
(HHAP) GRANT FUNDS**

Description: First amendment to this contract between Homeless Resource Council of the Sierras and the County of Placer.

WHEREAS, the parties wish to provide a full and complete statement of their respective responsibilities,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements of this Agreement, the parties hereby agree the following amendment is made to the original contract, additions are show in in bold italics:

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is made and entered into by and between the County of Placer, a political subdivision of the State of California, hereinafter referred to as County, and the Placer County Continuum of Care-515 through fiscal agent the Homeless Resource Council of the Sierras, hereinafter referred to as CoC or HRCS, individually, "Party" and/or collectively "Parties", for the designation of Collaborative Applicant and Lead Agency positions for Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP) grant funding, and commitment to uphold, participate in, and comply with actions, roles, and responsibilities of each collaborative applicant in the region as described in the HHAP Regionally Coordinated Homeless Action Plan, "Homeless Action Plan" .

I. Purpose and Background

The purpose of this MOU is to confirm agreements between the County and the CoC related to the positions of Collaborative Applicant and Lead Agency for HHAP grant funding and commit to uphold, participate in, and comply with the actions, roles, and responsibilities for implementation of the Homeless Action Plan.

The HHAP Program funding, made available from California's Interagency Council on Homelessness ("Cal ICH") within California's Business, Consumer Services and Housing Agency is intended to support local jurisdictions in their unified regional response to reduce and end homelessness; and

Collaborative Applicant is defined to mean an eligible applicant that has been designated by the Parties to apply for HHAP grant funding on behalf of the Parties.

The Lead Agency is defined as to mean the Party who shall take all required steps to

comply with the terms of the HHAP grants, including but not limited to all administrative and reporting requirements of the funding agency (State of California).

II. Duration

Except as provided in Section V (Termination), the duration of this amended MOU shall be from March 26, 2024 through June 30, 2026.

By execution of this MOU, the Parties agree that the responsibilities and agreements outlined in this MOU shall be effective March 26, 2024, and related activities conducted prior to the execution of the agreement shall be in compliance with all language stated in this original MOU.

III. Specific Responsibilities of the Parties

a. Joint County and CoC/HRCS

- i. Commitments to uphold, participate in, and comply with actions, roles, and responsibilities of each collaborative applicant as described in the HHAP Regionally Coordinated Homeless Action Plan, "Homeless Action Plan".
 1. Commitments to the roles and responsibilities as they pertain to outreach and site coordination, siting and use of available public land, the development of interim and permanent housing options, and coordinating, connecting, and delivering services to individuals experiencing homelessness or at risk of experiencing homelessness, within the region; section 2.1 of the Homeless Action Plan.
 2. Commitments to Key Actions to improve the system performance measures; section 2.2 of the Homeless Action Plan.
 3. Commitments to Key Actions to ensure racial and gender equity in service delivery, housing placements, housing retention, and any other means to affirm equitable access to housing and services for racial and ethnic groups overrepresented among residents experiencing homelessness; section 2.3 of the Homeless Action Plan.
 4. Commitments to actions to reduce homelessness among individuals exiting institutional settings, including but not limited to jails, prisons, hospitals, and any other institutions such as foster care, behavioral health facilities, etc. as applicable in the region; section 2.4 of the Homeless Action Plan.

5. Commitments to roles for the utilization of local, state, and federal funding programs to end homelessness; section 2.5 of the Homeless Action Plan.
6. Commitments to the roles and responsibilities to connect individuals to wrap-around services from all eligible federal, state, and local benefit programs; section 2.6 of the Homeless Action Plan.

b. County

- i. Designate the CoC and fiscal agent HRCS as Collaborative Applicant and Lead Agency for HHAP grants.
- ii. Assist the CoC with HHAP reporting requirements by providing information for HHAP grant funds allocated to the County and used in County contracts.
- iii. Participate in continuous quality improvement meetings within the CoC to review performance metrics towards Homeless Action Plan goals and metrics.
- iv. Participate in annual meetings as a function of the CoC with the County and contractors, to discuss contracts and projects and their relevance to the Homeless Action Plan.

c. CoC and HRCS

- i. As Collaborative Applicant, the CoC shall:
 1. Serve as the collaborative applicant to jointly submit a single application for HHAP funds on behalf of the County and the CoC and receive grant funds directly from the administering state agency.
 2. Develop a collaborative process for the development of joint HHAP applications and ensure compliance with grant criteria.
- ii. As Lead Agency, the CoC and HRCS shall:
 1. Build strategic partnerships and cultivate new service partnerships within the community.
 2. Lead completion of the annual Homeless Action Plan update with local and county governments and stakeholders as required by HHAP grant applications.
 3. Lead annual meetings as a function of the CoC with the County and contractors to discuss contracts and projects and their relevance to the Joint Homeless Action Plan.

4. Review and adhere to state guidance related to data reporting requirements and processes published by the administering state agency for HHAP funds, including:
 - HHAP Annual report guide
 - HHAP Annual report checklist
 - HHAP NOFAs
 - Health and Safety Code Section 50222, subdivision (a)
 - Coding HCFC Grants as funding Sources in HMIS
5. Work with providers to establish data collection and reporting measures as required by HHAP.
6. Measure and monitor performance of CoC and County funded projects as related to the Homeless Action Plan goals and performance metrics. This includes developing strategic goals to end homelessness, collecting and disseminating data to measure performance toward those goals, and continuously evaluating and improving performance.
7. Use 100% of the CoC annual HHAP allocation and 50% of the Placer County annual HHAP allocation, for this year and the following years, to fund programs or such programs as determined by the CoC. This amount is inclusive of 25% of the administrative allocation.
8. Provide 50% of the Placer County annual HHAP allocation to Placer County, for this year and the following years. This amount is inclusive of 25% of the administrative allocation.

d. Summary of Homeless Action Plan Commitments

i. This section summarizes the key commitments outlined in the Placer County Regionally Coordinated Homeless Action Plan ("Homeless Action Plan") for each of the following six areas:

1. Participating Jurisdictions' Roles and

Responsibilities (Section 2.1 of the Homeless Action Plan)

- ***Placer County and the CoC will collaborate on various initiatives to address homelessness within the region. These efforts encompass outreach, site coordination, land use, housing development, and service coordination.***
- ***Outreach and Site Coordination: Placer County is committed to working alongside other participants to ensure efficient and compassionate outreach strategies. This includes exploring opportunities to leverage existing county resources and facilities for potential use as homeless shelters or supportive housing locations. The CoC will play a crucial role***

in strengthening the Coordinated Entry System and connections to HMIS, a data collection tool that will improve resource allocation and service delivery. Additionally, Placer County recognizes the value of peer support within the system of care and will work towards increasing its utilization.

- ***Land Use and Development: Recognizing the importance of partnerships, Placer County will collaborate with local developers to acquire and develop suitable land for permanent housing solutions. Furthermore, the County will advocate for revising zoning laws to streamline the development of affordable housing units. Both Placer County and the CoC will play a role in facilitating partnerships for the development of affordable and supportive housing. This may involve supporting projects that include units designated for low-income residents or those in need of supportive services. Identifying shovel-ready partners and projects will be another key focus to expedite the funding process.***
- ***Development of Interim and Permanent Housing Options: Placer County understands the need for a multi-pronged approach that addresses both immediate and long-term housing needs. The County will explore various interim housing options, such as utilizing existing infrastructure, while simultaneously working towards establishing permanent supportive housing developments through community partnerships. The CoC will play a role in increasing the availability of rental and mortgage assistance funding to prevent individuals and families from entering homelessness in the first place. Additionally, the CoC will focus on expanding services and housing opportunities to help transition-aged youth avoid long-term homelessness.***
- ***Coordination of and Connection to Service Delivery: Placer County recognizes the holistic needs of individuals experiencing homelessness and strives to be a central point of connection for essential services. The County will actively collaborate with various service providers and community organizations to ensure seamless access to healthcare, behavioral health services, substance use treatment options, and other vital resources. The CoC will play a part in expanding year-round***

shelter capacity and improving data collection measures to inform future resource allocation decisions.

2. Performance Measures and Improvement Plan (Section 2.2 of the Homeless Action Plan)

- **Placer County and the CoC will track progress towards reducing homelessness through several key performance measures. These include:**
 - **The number of people experiencing homelessness who access services.**
 - **Racial and ethnic disparities among those experiencing homelessness.**
 - **The number of people experiencing unsheltered homelessness on a single night.**
 - **The number of people experiencing homelessness for the first time.**
 - **The number of people exiting homelessness into permanent housing.**
 - **The average length of time people experience homelessness while accessing services.**
 - **The percentage of people who return to homelessness within 6 months of exiting.**
 - **The number of successful placements from street outreach projects.**
 - **Racial and ethnic disparities in all the above categories.**
- **Key Actions: The CoC will lead efforts to improve system performance through various actions, including:**
 - **Increasing available housing through permanent supportive housing development and increased affordable housing options.**
 - **Strengthening housing-focused case management and post-housing supportive services.**
 - **Improving coordinated entry and assessment processes.**
 - **Increasing landlord engagement efforts and housing navigation strategies.**
 - **Doubling the number of housing liaison positions for outreach efforts.**
- **Improvement Plan: Placer County and the CoC are committed to developing and implementing an improvement plan based on data analysis of these**

performance measures. This plan will identify areas needing improvement and establish strategies to address them. The goal is to continually refine the homelessness response system to achieve better outcomes for all.

- **Funding: The funding source for these initiatives will be HHAP 3, HHAP 4, and HHAP 5.**
- **Timeline: The target date for completion of these actions is December 31, 2025.**

3. Equity Improvement Plan (Section 2.3 of the Homeless Action Plan)

- **Placer County and the CoC are committed to achieving racial and gender equity in service delivery, housing placements, and access to resources for all individuals experiencing homelessness. The CoC will implement several key actions to achieve this goal:**
 - **Enhanced Data Collection: Strengthen data collection mechanisms to capture the intersectional experiences of race and gender within service delivery contexts. This disaggregated data will be used to identify disparities and tailor interventions to address the specific needs of different demographic groups.**
 - **Targeted Outreach: Conduct outreach initiatives focused on communities disproportionately affected by housing inequities, including racial and gender minority groups. Partner with local organizations to increase awareness and access to housing placement resources within these communities.**
 - **Promoting Housing Retention: Share best practices and anti-discrimination policies with partner agencies in housing programs. This includes monitoring and addressing instances of discrimination based on race or gender to ensure equitable treatment and housing retention for all individuals. These practices will be required of any agency contracting with the CoC.**
 - **Equitable Procurement: Enhance data collection mechanisms to monitor and evaluate equity in procurement practices. This data will be used to track outcomes by race and gender. By analyzing procurement data, the CoC can identify disparities, address barriers, and ensure fair and**

inclusive procurement processes that benefit all stakeholders.

- ***These actions will lead to informed decision-making, targeted interventions, and ultimately improved outcomes for racially and gender-diverse populations experiencing homelessness.***

4. Plan to Reduce the Number of People Experiencing Homelessness Upon Exiting an Institutional Setting (Section 2.4 of the Homeless Action Plan)

- ***Placer County recognizes the vulnerability of individuals transitioning out of institutions like jails, prisons, hospitals, and foster care. The County is committed to reducing homelessness among this population through a collaborative effort with various partner agencies.***
- ***The plan focuses on ensuring these individuals are aware of and connected to housing resources before or upon release. This will involve collaboration with:***
 - ***Placer County Adult System of Care: This agency will work with the Sheriff's Office, Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, local hospitals, and the Children's System of Care to identify individuals at risk of homelessness upon release.***
 - ***Community Behavioral Health Providers: These providers will offer housing-related case management services to those who qualify for county behavioral health services.***
- ***By connecting individuals with housing resources and support services, Placer County aims to reduce the likelihood of them experiencing homelessness after leaving an institutional setting.***

4. Plan to Utilize Local, State, and Federal Funds to End Homelessness (Section 2.5 of the Homeless Action Plan)

- ***Placer County and the CoC will leverage a variety of local, state, and federal funding sources to support programs and initiatives aimed at ending homelessness. Key funding streams include:***
 - ***Homekey Program: This state funding will be used to convert an 82-unit hotel in Roseville into permanent supportive housing.***
 - ***Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention Program (HHAP): Multiple rounds of HHAP funding will be used for various purposes,***

including:

- **Permanent supportive housing development (Rounds 1 and 4)**
- **Operating subsidies for existing permanent supportive housing**
- **Administrative costs for CoC operations**
- **HOME Investment Partnerships Act (HOME):** These funds will be used for program implementation, outreach and engagement, and bridge housing initiatives.
- **Parolee or Probation Programs:** State funding will support homeless outreach, transitional housing, and supportive services for individuals re-entering the community after incarceration.
- **County General Fund: Local General Fund** resources will be used for navigation services, interim housing, permanent housing placements, and case management.

6. Plan to Connect People Experiencing Homelessness to All Eligible Benefit Programs (Section 2.6 of the Homeless Action Plan)

- **Placer County is committed to ensuring individuals experiencing homelessness are connected to and receive all relevant federal, state, and local benefit programs. This will be achieved through a collaborative effort between various Placer County departments including Health and Human Services (Adult System of Care, Human Services, Children's System of Care), Public Health, and the Office of Education.**
- **Key benefit programs include:**
 - **Cash Assistance:** CalWORKs provides financial assistance and supportive services to families with children. Homeless families may be eligible for special needs payments to help cover temporary or permanent housing costs.
 - **Food Assistance:** CalFresh provides monthly benefits to purchase groceries. Expedited services may be available to allow for quicker access to benefits.
 - **Disability Benefits:** The County offers outreach and assistance programs to help individuals apply for SSI/SSP and other disability benefits.
 - **In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS):** IHSS

provides assistance with daily living activities for eligible individuals with disabilities.

- ***Protective Services: Adult Protective Services and Child Welfare Services investigate reports of abuse or neglect and provide supportive services.***
- ***Child Care: The County Office of Education provides child care referrals and can connect families with subsidized child care options.***
- ***Healthcare: Medi-Cal provides health insurance coverage to low-income individuals and families.***
- ***Through outreach, application assistance, and collaboration across departments, Placer County will strive to maximize benefit enrollment among the homeless population. This will help meet basic needs, improve stability, and ultimately aid individuals and families on their path out of homelessness.***

IV. Amendments

This MOU may be amended upon mutual agreement of both County and CoC. Any additional responsibilities delegated to the Lead Agency shall be consistent with the CoC Governance Charter.

V. Termination

Either party may terminate this MOU by giving 60 days written notice to the other parties. If the funds relied upon to undertake activities described in this MOU are withdrawn or reduced, or if additional conditions are placed on such funding, any party may terminate this MOU within 30 days by providing written notice to the other parties. The termination shall be effective on the date specified in the notice of termination.

WHEREAS the California Interagency Council on Homelessness released a Notice of Funding Availability for non-competitive Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Round Five (HHAP-5) funds, and

WHEREAS these subsidies and support services help to reduce homelessness and housing instability for low-income Placer County residents who are actively working towards housing stability and self-sufficiency, and

WHEREAS Placer County's Adult System of Care has successfully implemented these grants previously and wishes to continue supporting Placer County residents with these services.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors, County of Placer, State of California, that it:

Authorizes the Director of Health and Human Services, or designee, to apply for housing-related subsidies from California Interagency Council on Homelessness for an amount not to exceed \$978,154, and to sign the resulting agreement and related documentation with Risk Management and County Counsel concurrence, and to sign subsequent amendments not to exceed \$97,815, consistent with the subject matter and scope of work with Risk Management and County Counsel concurrence.
