#### **Outreach & Site Coordination**

Participating Jurisdictions	Roles & Responsibilities
San Mateo County	The County of San Mateo Human Services Agency (HSA) and homeless outreach service providers across the county partner closely with cities throughout the county to coordinate outreach services. The County also contracts with Core Service Agencies to provide crisis intervention and referrals to other agencies in the homelessness response system.
CA-512 Daly City/San Mateo County CoC	The CoC coordinates with agencies throughout the region to strengthen the County's collective response to homelessness. This includes working with street outreach programs and supporting programs to implement targeted expansions to offer services after hours and on weekends and deepen connections with health and behavioral health services.

#### Regional Coordination Narrative - Outreach & Site Coordination

As the collaborative applicant for the CA-512 Daly City/San Mateo CoC, HSA is positioned to serve as a coordination hub, working with Cities, departments within the County, non-profit organizations, faith-based organizations, advocates, and others to coordinate outreach and services for people experiencing homelessness.

The County of San Mateo Behavioral Health and Recovery Services (BHRS) is a key partner in several mobile outreach efforts (including Street Medicine and Homeless Outreach Teams), focusing on engaging people who are unsheltered and supporting them to access needed behavioral health services, as well as making the transition to shelter and housing.

HSA also funds and coordinates Homeless Outreach programs in Cities across the county that work closely with local police officers who are trained to connect unsheltered individuals in San Mateo to relevant resources.

HSA contracts with partner agencies geographically dispersed throughout the county to serve as 8 Core Service Agencies (Cores). The Cores often serve as a first point of contact for households, supporting them to resolve their current housing crisis and prevent homelessness, or assisting them in connecting to resources throughout the County and CoC to identify housing and resources that can help them exit homelessness.

The County works with the Cores and other community partners to ensure that outreach efforts have broad geographic coverage and are adjusted as needed to maximize the success of the outreach efforts. This coordination has been successful in establishing 100% geographic coverage by outreach efforts as cited in

#### **Regional Coordination Narrative - Land Use & Development**

The County invests and administers much of the local, State, and federal sources of funding to develop non-congregate shelters and supportive housing programs to support ending homelessness. Coordination of resources, information, and subsidies occurs between multiple County departments and community partnerships to support seeking funding for and developing new projects. Interdepartmental collaboration occurs between the County's Executive's Office, HSA's Center on Homelessness, HSA's other departments (including public benefits, child welfare, employment services, and veteran's services), the Department of Housing (DOH, which includes the County's public housing authority), the Health Department (which includes Behavioral Health and Recovery Services and the Medical Center), Probation Department, and the Sheriff's Office. The County Department of Housing has a pipeline of affordable housing projects and includes incentives in affordable housing development funding opportunities for the inclusion of units prioritized for households experiencing homelessness. The County has successfully secured five hotels via Project Homekey grants, including two for supportive housing for households experiencing homelessness. As the lead agency for the CoC, HSA also coordinates with local non-profit agencies and other CoC participants to coordinate services and subsidies for new interim and permanent housing options.

## **Development of Interim and Permanent Housing Options**

The County departments involved include HSA, the Department of Housing, Real Property, the Department of Public Works, the County Executive's Office, and the Board of Supervisors. The County continues to seek out opportunities to pool and align funding for interim and permanent supportive housing to better serve people experiencing homelessness.
CA-512 Daly City/San Mateo County CoC	The CoC supports the development of interim and permanent housing options by coordinating with CoC participating agencies and identifying opportunities to expand housing capacity. The CoC also funds multiple permanent housing projects, including

prioritizing funding for permanent supportive housing projects.

Given the individual roles and responsibilities identified above, describe and explain how all participating jurisdictions are or will begin to coordinate these efforts to develop adequate interim and permanent housing options to address and end homelessness in the region.

#### Regional Coordination Narrative - Shelter, Interim, and PH Options

The County of San Mateo is leveraging its Affordable Housing Fund (administered by the Department of Housing [DOH]) to add new permanent housing units targeted to extremely low-income households and will use the Housing Authority's authority to project-base Housing Choice Vouchers to incentivize the development of new housing units for people experiencing homelessness. HSA monitors the need for shelter as represented by the shelter waitlist on a daily basis and uses that information for planning and sometimes to adjust across household types served in order to best meet the need. As the coordinating entity for the CoC, HSA collaborates with the CoC membership, including local non-profit agencies and other CoC participants, to apply for additional resources to expand the available inventory of interim and permanent housing solutions within the County, such as Homekey funding.

## **Coordination of & Connection to Service Delivery**

#### **Participating Jurisdictions**

#### **Roles & Responsibilities**

CA-512 Daly City/San Mateo County CoC

HSA, as the lead agency for the CoC, oversees the coordination and connection to the delivery of services for individuals experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness within the region via the Coordinated Entry System (CES). HSA contracts with a non-profit organization within the CoC to operate elements of the CES. The CES provides all households within the region at imminent risk of or currently experiencing homelessness with Diversion services to attempt to divert them from the homelessness system and remain housed or return to housing. If the household cannot be successfully diverted, then they will receive a CES assessment and be referred via the CES to shelter. HSA also partners with the County Jail and the San Mateo County Medical Center to have clients referred to the CES in the weeks leading up to their institutional exit to support their access to programs and resources to prevent exiting to street homelessness. HSA manages a central referral list for housing placement via CES and makes referrals to permanent housing programs based on the number of openings weekly. HSA tracks the rate of acceptance of CES referrals and reasons for refusal and monitors to ensure programs are compliant with Housing First principles. HSA coordinates a Racial Equity Committee to inform the work of the CoC and support service providers in enhancing culturally competent services. Committee meetings are led by HSA and are hosted every other month. The work of the committee includes developing cultural competency and racial equity trainings for local providers and stakeholders to bring consistency in knowledge and practice across the homeless response system; engaging in qualitative data gathering to identify and understand the causes of racial and other disparities in the system; and increasing representation of those with lived experience in CoC and agency leadership.

San Mateo County

HSA contracts and works closely with several community nonprofits and government agencies that create a social safety net system known as the Core Service Network. The organizations in the network are known as Core Service Agencies (Cores). Each of the 8 Cores serves a different geographic area in the County. The Cores work in close collaboration with HSA to provide individuals and families with basic emergency and support services to stabilize their living situations. These services include crisis intervention and referrals based on an evaluation of their needs and qualifications for assistance, food, clothing, emergency financial rent or utility assistance, school supplies for students, and other basic necessities. HSA contracts for jurisdiction-wide homeless outreach services in order to ensure active outreach and engagement throughout the region. Outreach teams are able to connect individuals experiencing unsheltered homelessness to Coordinated Entry in the field. HSA also funds many shelter services and coordinates with others to meet people's basic needs and assist households with obtaining permanent housing. HSA coordinates these services to ensure a comprehensive system of homeless services is available.

#### Regional Coordination Narrative - Coordination & Connection to Service Delivery

The County of San Mateo Human Services Agency (HSA) administers much of the local, state, and federal sources of funding to address homelessness. The County of San Mateo also coordinates resources for homeless services occurs between multiple County departments and community partners to ensure that the needs of persons experiencing homelessness are being met, and that all services are aligned and coordinated. Interdepartmental collaboration occurs between the County Executive's Office, HSA's Center on Homelessness, HSA's other departments (including public benefits, child welfare, employment services and veterans' services), the Department of Housing (which includes the county's public housing authority), the Health Department (which includes Behavioral Health and Recovery Services and the Medical Center), Probation Department, and the Sheriff's Office. As the lead agency for the CoC, HSA also coordinates with local non-profit agencies and CoC participants to coordinate and expand access to interim and permanent housing options.

#### Narrative for place-based encampment resolution

In April 2024, San Mateo County was awarded an Encampment Resolution Funding grant (ERF-3) through Cal ICH. Beginning in July 2024, through this grant, San Mateo County will serve 211 people living unsheltered in 26 encampment sites throughout the County. The County is working closely with the six cities where these encampments are located to coordinate service delivery at these sites. Individuals in the ERF encampment sites will be served by field-based Multi-Disciplinary Teams (MDTs) composed of specialists in outreach and engagement, Coordinated Entry (CE), and housing navigation from local service providers; and by substance use treatment, mental health, and medical care through various County departments, including the SMC Human Services Agency (HSA), Department of Housing (DOH), Behavioral Health and Recovery Services (BHRS), and Public Health Policy and Planning (PHPP). Unsheltered residents living in these ERF encampment sites will be served by a new Rapid Rehousing program providing security deposits, move-in costs, landlord incentives, and rental assistance for ERF participants and will also be prioritized for placement at 70 new supportive housing units partially funded by ERF.

HSA also provides specialized disability benefits advocacy and housing support through the state-funded Housing and Disability Advocacy Program (HDAP) for households that appear to be SSI/SSDI-eligible or CAPI-eligible, are not yet connected to those benefits, and are experiencing homelessness.

# In-home supportive services

In-home supportive services are increasingly a critical component of success in enabling individuals to remain housed successfully. Shelter programs are identifying the need for IHSS among shelter clients and are able to refer clients to IHSS while clients are in shelter. Permanent housing services providers also refer clients to IHSS as needed. HSA ensures that shelter and permanent housing program providers are aware of IHSS and its referral pathways.

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### Adult protective services

Access to Adult Protective Services (APS) is centralized via the TIES phone line. San Mateo County

HSA's role is in ensuring that shelter and permanent housing program providers are aware of APS and its referral pathways, which HSA has done through hosting presentations to homeless services providers. HSA and Aging and Adult Services have recently strengthened connections through collaboration on the Home Safe program.

welfare services for the

County. This enables staff within HSA to

coordinate closely to prevent homelessness among former foster youth and increase housing resources for this population. HSA's Children and Families Services branch provides intensive services to youth to support their needs including housing as they transition into adulthood. HSA, as the Child Welfare Agency, also maintains a close partnership with Housing Authority of the San Mateo County, which has a supply of Family **Unification Program** (FUP) Vouchers for youth leaving the foster care system, to ensure they do not become homeless. The local

homeless youth provider, StarVista, is actively involved in our CoC and receives HSA funding for a transitional housing program for homeless youth. StarVista received San Mateo County

Housing Authority of the San Mateo County

HEAP and currently receives HHAP funding for a rapid rehousing program targeting transition-age youth.

#### Child care

CalWORKs families qualify for childcare to enable parents to engage in work-related activities. HSA's primary strategy for connecting families to childcare resources is via the CalWORKs program. Over the last year, HSA partnered with the Coordinated Entry System (CES) service provider and family shelter providers to develop a direct referral form to apply for CalWORKs services for households who are experiencing homelessness. # Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Between County of San Mateo Human Services Agency (County) and CA-512 Daly City/San Mateo County Continuum of Care (CoC)

This memorandum of understanding (MOU) is made and entered into as of 3/26/2024 by and between the County of San Mateo Human Services Agency (County) and the CA-512 Daly City/San Mateo County Continuum of Care (CoC). This MOU outlines actions, roles, and responsibilities and commits the County and the COC to participate in and comply with the Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan (RCHAP) completed and submitted as part of the County and the CoC's application for Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Grant Program, Round 5 (HHAP-5). The RCHAP, as it may be amended from time to time, is attached hereto as Exhibit A, and incorporated by this reference. In the event of any conflict between the terms of this MOU and the RCHAP, the RCHAP shall prevail. Unless otherwise provided, terms in this MOU have the meaning set out in the RCHAP.

# I. Commitment to the Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan (RCHAP)

- a. The County and CoC agree to adhere to the commitments set out in the RCHAP.
- b. The County and CoC agree to work together in partnership to achieve the objectives of the RCHAP, and to work in good faith to resolve any disagreements or disputes that arise in the performance of that work.

### II. Summary of the RCHAP Components

The RCHAP has six key sections, outlined below. Within each section, the responsibilities of the CoC and County are outlined.

- a. Section 2.1 Participating Jurisdictions' Roles and Responsibilities A description of the roles and responsibilities of both the County and CoC for (1) Outreach and site coordination, (2) Siting and use of available land, (3) Development of interim and permanent housing options, and (4) Coordination and connection to the delivery of services for individuals experiencing or at risk of homelessness within the region.
- **b.** Section 2.2 System Performance Measures Improvement Plan Outlines the key actions, collaborators, timeframe, and success measurement method that the County or CoC will take for each of the System Performance Measures for the region.
- c. Section 2.3 Equity Improvement Plan Outlines the key actions, collaborators, timeframe, and success measurement method that the County or CoC will take for each to ensure racial and gender equity in (1) Service delivery, (2) Housing placements, and (3) Housing retention, as well as steps the County and CoC will take to identify changes to procurement and other means to achieve equitable access to housing and services for groups overrepresented among residents experiencing homelessness for the region.
- **d.** Section 2.4 Plan to Reduce the Number of People Experiencing Homelessness Upon Exiting an Institutional Setting Outlines the key actions that the County

- and CoC will take to reduce the number of people experiencing homelessness upon exiting a (1) Jail, (2) Prison, (3) Hospital, and (4) Other institutional settings (such as foster care, behavioral health facilities, etc.).
- e. Section 2.5 Plan to Utilize Local, State, and Federal Funds to End Homelessness

   Explains how the region intends to utilize local, state, and federal funding programs to end homelessness.
- **f.** Section 2.6 Plan to Connect People Experiencing Homelessness to All Eligible Benefit Programs Outline how the County and CoC are connecting or will connect people to all eligible federal, state, and local benefit programs.
