Question 1

A demonstration of how the jurisdiction has coordinated, and will continue to coordinate, with other jurisdictions, including the specific role of each applicant in relation to other applicants in the region.

Question 1 Response

History and Background of the Colusa, Glenn, Trinity Counties CoC:

Colusa County is a small rural county located approximately 70 miles north of Sacramento and was established in 1850. The county's population is 21,396 (U.S. Census Bureau, 2017) and the county seat is the Town of Colusa. The county is comprised of 1,151 square miles of land. The County's economy is based on agriculture and related-businesses. Commodities include alfalfa, almonds, rice, corn, walnuts, wheat, pistachios, tomatoes, and olives. The number of households living in poverty is 14.24% of the total population; this is higher in comparison to the state and federal lower rates. Female heads of households are twice as likely (46%) to live in poverty in comparison to male head of households (19%); married couples living in poverty consist of 35% of the population.

Glenn County is a small rural county located approximately 90 miles north of Sacramento. Glenn County is primarily an agricultural community with mountains on the west, the Sacramento River to the east, and the Interstate 5 corridor running through the middle, flanked by rich farm. With over 1,188 farms, agriculture remains the primary source of Glenn County's economy. The county seat is Willows. Major commodities include almonds, walnuts, rice, milk products, livestock, and apiary products. Glenn County has a population of 28,094 (U.S. Census Bureau, 2017). A total of 14.8% of the population live in poverty, in comparison to the state (13.3%) and the Federal level (12.3%). Glenn County has a 6.6% unemployment rate based on December 2018 Economic Development Department labor market report, which is higher than the Federal unemployment rate level of 3.8%.

Trinity County, is located in Northern California in the Trinity Alps Wilderness. Located in the lower reaches of the Cascade Range in California, midway between Redding in Shasta County and the Northern Redwood Coast, Trinity County encompasses approximately 3,200 square miles of Granite Peak alpine grandeur. Tucked away among fir and pine forested slopes, wildflowers in season cloak remote dells with splashes of brilliant color. Weaverville is the county seat. Trinity Lake, Lewiston ans Ruth Lake, and the Trinity River all provide outdoor activities such as: fishing, boating and kayaking. The county consists of 12,709 (U.S. Census Bureau, 2017) making it the fourth least-populous county in California, of which 20.3% of the population lives in poverty in comparison to the State (13.3%) and Federal (12.3%) rates. The county's demographic is comprised of 87.4% white, and 12.3% non-white race or origins. Each County within the CoC (Colusa, Glenn, and Trinity County) have their geographic and demographic differences, as noted above, but are able to collaborate consistently and relate to challenges faced by rural communities. Throughout the year, the CoC meets for monthly executive Board meetings, quarterly regional meetings with each County's stakeholders, and County Local CoC meetings. The CoC Executive Board contains representatives from the key service providers in the region. Glenn County serves as the Lead Agency for the CoC as well as the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) administrator. The Lead Agency has convened work groups and trainings focused around improving the coordinated entry system, has provided HMIS user trainings, and has engaged in quality improvement trainings and meetings with service providers. These collaborative efforts will continue with the goal of enhancing various measures, including improving the coordinated entry system (CES). The Lead Agency aims to continue expanding opportunities for technical assistance and focused collaborative check-in meetings. Example areas may be improving HMIS data quality, improving understanding of CoC policies and procedures, service delivery, compliance with funding source requirements, and strategic planning.

This application is a joint application between the CoC, Glenn County, and Colusa County. Throughout the planning process it was determined that the Glenn County Community Action Department (GCCAD/Glenn County) will administer funding in Glenn County for both the CoC allocation and the County allocation, the Colusa County Department of Health and Human Services (Colusa DHHS/Colusa County) will administer funding in Colusa County for both the CoC and the County allocation, and Trinity County Department of Grants and Housing (Trinity County) will administer funding in Trinity County for the CoC allocation.

Through the Local Homeless Action Plan/HHAP 3 planning process. This process was initiated with group discussions regarding the approach and purpose of the LHAP at the Dos Rios Executive Board meetings, the Dos Rios Regional meeting, and County Local CoC meetings. The Lead Agency compiled the data for Part I from Point in Time data, HMIS data, and the Baseline data provided by Cal ICH. The next step in the process was evaluating this data to develop goals and strategies for Part II. Due to the unique needs of each County and varying existing landscapes, the Lead Agency utilized liaisons from the Executive Board to initiate strategic planning in their local forums to establish outcome goals and strategies for Part II. The input from each County liaison was compiled into an initial draft of the Local Homeless Action Plan, which was distributed to the Executive Board for input, and then scheduled for public comment on the Glenn County Board of Supervisors agenda on June 21, 2022.

Question 2 Response

Partnerships described below are in perspective for each of the organizations that will be administering the funds (described in question 1).

GCCAD is the primary housing services provider in Glenn County and has established partnerships with all of above-mentioned organizations. GCCAD is part of the Dos Rios Continuum of Care as the Lead Agency and HMIS Administrator. GCCAD has an identified liaison with each partner to ensure homeless individuals/families our referred and assisted with housing services. Currently, GCCAD is under contract with anthem managed care plan and is receiving referrals from them. GCCAD also operates multiple housing sub-contracts with the Glenn County Social Services Department.

Trinity County operates a crisis response team that includes the following programs/organizations: Adult Protective Services and Public Guardian; Eligibility and Employment Services; Behavioral Health Services, AOD and Substance Use Disorder Services (SUD); Partnership Health; Victim Witness; Domestic Violence Services; Pronation; Code Enforcement; Ministerial Association; Smart Center (job/employment); Veteran's Services' Northern Valley Catholic Social Service' Child Welfare Services; McKinney-Vento Services; Redding Rancheria (tribal services)' Mountain Valley medical clinics and discharge planning through the

Weaverville Hospital. All providers/partners in the county (with the exception of Partnership Health), are regular participants on the crisis responses team and meet monthly to discuss funding gaps in services, referrals, HMIS/CES, and other local issues/needs that we encounter over the course of servings the target population.

Colusa DHHS has established a referral process that local health care, behavioral health, Colusa County social services departments and jails can use to refer people to housing case managers for services. Colusa DHHS meets regularly with the Dos Rios CoC and the Colusa CoC to plan activities and discuss local events and activities that support the homeless community and low-income families. Meetings are done quarterly. Street outreach efforts under HHAP 3 will be a collaboration of efforts between the listed entities. HHAP funding will also go to support individuals receiving support from those groups. Case managers will work with law enforcement to find housing for individuals leaving the prison system. Funding will be available to help Behavioral Health clients obtain housing if their services cannot adequately provide the need. Woodland Community College and the Colusa Office of Education have a tremendous relationship with the case managers and will be where individuals are referred for continued education.

Question 3

A description of specific actions the applicant will take to ensure racial and gender equity in service delivery, housing placements, and housing retention and changes to procurement or other means of affirming racial and ethnic groups that are overrepresented among residents experiencing homelessness have equitable access to housing and services.

Question 3 Response

This year representatives from the Lead Agency of the CoC participated in the CA REAL (California Racial Equity Action Lab) technical assistance program to establish a racial equity goal for the CoC. Through this process, the team set an initial goal with intent to increase representation and bring voices to the decision-making and strategic planning forums. The formal goal that was established was, "By December 31, 2022, we will increase outreach to recruit at least one person from the Indigenous and Latino/x/a community/population who currently or has lived experienced of Homelessness, to regularly attend stakeholder discussions held at the local and regional CoC levels; to ensure our funding and policy decisions reflect the needs of communities of color we serve and to ensure we have inclusive and equitable representation for all populations that we serve under our county/CoC." In addition to this goal established by the CoC, each County (Colusa, Glenn, and Trinity) have identified the following actions/strategies:

As a service provider and as the Lead Agency for the CoC, Glenn County facilitates and promotes racial equity practices. Glenn County provides services in a manner that demonstrates cultural competency and respects ethnic diversity. Program documents and applications are provided in both English and Spanish, and program staff offer services in English and Spanish. Glenn County follows the best practices of Housing First and does not discriminate against any individual based on the status of race and/or ethnicity, or gender. Glenn County applies a "trauma-informed" approach when working with customers through warm handoffs and referrals to additional services with our partner agencies. Information is always shared in our customers' preferred language to make them feel more comfortable and understand the available resources and services. We continue to solicit feedback from our customers to ensure that we create sustainable solutions to help them achieve successful outcomes. With GCCAD's planned street outreach activities under HHAP 3, equitable outreach and service delivery will remain a top priority. In addition, Glenn County will continue to analyze data to determine gaps and ways to reach underserved populations.

To prioritize the advancement of racial equity in all housing/homeless programs and across systems and

units of government in the jurisdictions, Trinity County has developed a plan to improve the equity of access to resources and programs. Trinity County will be a leader in the community by promoting collaborations among service organizations, housing providers, units of government, businesses, the crisis response system and other partners to promote equity practices. Trinity County will identify how they are working to ensure racial equity in access by analyzing exit data from previous programs and finding the underserved and addressing ways to reach their underserved groups, with specific attention (but not limited to), Black, Native and Indigenous, Latino/Latina/Lantxn, Asian, Pacific Islander and other people of color who have been historically marginalized and disproportionally impacted by housing segregations, poverty, homelessness, and COVID-19.

Colusa County's housing programs are based on No Wrong door and Housing First practices. By removing barriers, our goal is to increase access to services. Colusa County recognizes the importance of providing culturally sensitive information and services. There are policies in place that prohibit discrimination which all staff are required to review regularly along with annual trainings to provide current information to help them develop tools to better assist our customers. Trainings include Sexual Orientation, Gender Identify and Expression (SOGIE), and Civil Right Division 21. Several of Colusa DHHS's case managers are bilingual (English/Spanish) to help assist the large population of monolingual customers who are accessing services. For other spoken languages, translation services are available to ensure people can receive assistance in their native language.

Question 4

A description of how the applicant will make progress in preventing exits to homelessness from institutional settings, including plans to leverage funding from mainstream systems for evidence-based housing and housing-based solutions to homelessness.

Question 4 Response

Glenn County has established partnerships and works very closely with most of mainstream systems and key partners, including the Health and Human Services, which includes Behavioral Health, Public Health, and Social Services (including the Child Welfare System, Adult Services, and Public Assistance programs, in addition to many other programs). GCCAD also maintains partnerships with law enforcement, the Probation Department, and the County Jail. Glenn County also collaborates closely with the Westside Domestic Violence Shelter and Unity House, a sober living environment. Glenn County works closely with these partners to ensure that clients don't exit into homelessness as we have implemented Housing First Module. The Glenn County Community Action Department serves as the primary housing services provider

in Glenn County but also operates employment and workforce development services, a health and wellness program (currently under contract with Anthem managed care), victim/witness services, and a weatherization and utility assistance program. We are working on leveraging funding from these various partners and systems to provide evidence-based solutions to homelessness.

Trinity County strives to implement a promising prevention activity that includes rapid rehousing with supportive services and rental or mortgage assistance, including arrears. Trinity County lacks a viable housing system, so reality has demonstrated that the hospitals in both Shasta and Trinity County have discharged or released persons without a home to homelessness. Although discharge planners are part of our crisis response team, the lack of beds/units is so significant that many times we are only able to provide outreach/engagement and supportive services, both of which are not as a successful as they would be when complemented with shelter/housing options. Trinity County plans to build capacity for increased beds that we can control concerning access and barrier removal.

Colusa County has recognized the unique housing needs of people experiencing homelessness/ not only their needs for a physical place to reside but also the tools and skills necessary to be successful in maintaining stable housing. By coordinating services with our CoC partners, we aim to increase accessibility for people exiting institutional settings. Case managers assist customers in accessing additional resources by offering referrals and individualized plans to help clients address their social determinants of health. A representative from the Colusa County Jail is on the Colusa Continuum of Care and can make housing referrals to the case managers. Case managers partner with the Colusa Office of Education and Woodland Community College to develop skills training plans. The Colusa County One-Stop can assist with job services and placements. Partnership with Behavioral Health for classes and treatment would be provided. Colusa DHHS's plan would be a whole-person approach to recovery and moving forward. As more and more people are being released from institutional settings, funding, both private and public, has been made available to support those trying to get back on their feet. Through the duration of the grant, Colusa DHHS will seek and invest time researching those entities and looking to partner and provide additional financial support in terms of income. Colusa DHHS understands the limitations on employment and income access for those discharged from institutions. By addressing these barriers, we hope to prevent them from becoming homeless again.

Question 5

Specific and quantifiable systems improvements that the applicant will take to improve the delivery of housing and services to people experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness, including, but not limited to, the following:

- (I) Capacity building and workforce development for service providers within the jurisdiction, including removing barriers to contracting with culturally specific service providers and building the capacity of providers to administer culturally specific services.
- (II) Strengthening the data quality of the recipient's Homeless Management Information System.
- (III) Increasing capacity for pooling and aligning housing and services funding from existing, mainstream, and new funding.
- (IV) Improving homeless point-in-time counts.
- (V) Improving coordinated entry systems to strengthen coordinated entry systems to eliminate racial bias, to create a youthspecific coordinated entry system or youth-specific coordinated entry access points, or to improve the coordinated entry assessment tool to ensure that it contemplates the specific needs of youth experiencing homelessness.

Question 5 Response

As Glenn County serves as the Lead HMIS administrator, we are always trying to strengthen our data quality information on the HMIS system and our HMIS participating agency. We conduct quarterly HMIS and CES partner meetings. This funding will assist with the continued implementation of HUD requirements as they roll out.

In Trinity County, the plan for system improvements includes developing an interim sheltering option that will build the local capacity to meet the needs of the homeless, especially the chronically homeless, population and youth. Public services will be available on-site, and transportation to medical services, both public and private, will increase provider capacity to serve. We are fortunate that the County is small enough and works well as a team to resolve issues, make referrals, respond swiftly in a crisis and braid funding to strength our ability to serve; however we have fallen short in placing program participants in safe hosing that they qualify for or can afford with a subsidy or current income levels.

Colusa County is currently working to improve the capacity for pooling and aligning housing services and funding. By streamlining and strengthening how we track and manage our housing programs grants, we are increasing the efficiency in how services are delivered and how data and reports are created. This conjunction with HMIS will help develop policies and practices to enhance services and customer experience. This activity will also strengthen the data quality for the HMIS system because the data collected internally will be uploaded to HMIS. Through the expansion of our street outreach program, we will improve our relationships and build rapport with the unhoused community, and by doing so, we anticipate greater participation from people experiencing homelessness in our programs. This would include future Point in Time Counts, helping ensure that we continue to have accurate and reliable data.

None of the Counties in the CoC have an emergency shelter. Glenn County will use interim housing funds to provide motel vouchers to homeless individuals. Enhanced case management is provided to all clients, as well as resources and referrals.

Trinity County will leverage funds to develop an interim/emergency housing solution. Most chronically homeless persons are not ready to go from the street to a long term housing situation and need time to build trust while in non-congregate sheltering situations. Establishing a non-congregate shelter in Trinity County would give program participants the opportunity to be safe in a shelter, in a room by themself, while they build trust and work on any barriers that they wish to. Trinity County's chronically homeless population have significant challenges to being housed, including untreated behavioral health and physical health conditions which would prevent them from living alone or without some sort of support or ongoing care. These conditions can be treated in an environment where supportive services are available daily. Once health conditions or circumstances approve and participants opt for longer term housing, the housing navigator would work to establish opportunities for placement.

Explanation of How the Proposed Use of Funds Will Complement Existing local, state, and federal funds and equitably close the gaps identified in the Local Landscape Analysis

In Trinity County, HHAP 3 funding will be utilized in support of an interim housing/emergency shelter development. The target population includes homeless persons who have been assessed through the coordinated entry system and have been prioritized for housing placement. HHAP funding will be braided with several other revenue streams to acquire rehabilitation and operation of a 13 bed housing environment that will meet the housing needs of the target population. At least one unit will be reserved for program participants that are youth. This project will fill a gap in the crisis response system as Trinity County currently does not have an emergency shelter and has lost 12% of the local housing stock in the past 4 years due to wildfires. Trinity County lacks the capacity to provide housing options to person with significant barriers to long-term, stable housing. The conversion of a motel to interim housing will build the capacity of the crisis response system while saving funding by not spending emergency shelter funds on motel vouchers., which are not always available. Having a county administered emergency shelter/interim housing option will not only save money, but will fill a significant gap in the housing system and allow the opportunity to provide comprehensive services on site.

Colusa County's proposed project will focus on three categories to help meet the goals identified in the Local Homeless Action Plan. The categories include Outreach, Rapid Rehousing, and Shelter Diversion and Prevention/ The housing team will increase outreach to people experiencing homelessness in order to improve linkage to services. By building rapport with customers on a one on one basis and meeting them where they are we aim to develop a strong relationship with the Unhousing Community in the Colusa County services area. Outreach activities will include the distribution of care packages mad up of personal protective gear, as well as hygiene and basic needs kits. Supplies for outreach will also be tailored to individual needs and can include vouchers for transportation, food, showers, or laundry services. Under Rapid Rehousing, Colusa County estimates being able to assist 18 households with despite and first month's rent. Due to the County not having an established emergency shelter it is imperative that we keep people housed when they are facing the risk of experiencing homelessness. Based on estimated rent cost and according to the 2020 Census, between 2016 -2020 monthly rent in Colusa averages \$918. By being able to support customers when they need rental assistance will help in preventing the increased number of people experiencing homelessness in Colusa Housing. These funds will be used in conjunction with emergency shelter funds from the Emergency Solutions Grant- Coronavirus (ESG-CV). Outreach from HHAP 3 will complement EG-CV. As street outreach is done the hope is that the individual enters our office and accepts emergency shelter or transitional housing while permanent housing is sought. If an individual seek social security in the Homeless Disability Advocacy Program (HDAP).

Glenn County's proposed program activates in include interim housing, street outreach, and system support. Through interim housing Glenn County will provide assistance via a voucher system utilizing our HMIS Coordinated Entry System component to assist Homeless individuals. Through the CE process we have 45 homeless individuals identified in our community. Enhance case management is provided to all clients, resources and referrals is also a process in the case management. Through street outreach Glenn County will provide essential services to unsheltered individuals on the street, or in the parks and other unsheltered settings.
