# **Question 1**

A demonstration of how the jurisdiction has coordinated, and will continue to coordinate, with other jurisdictions, including the specific role of each applicant in relation to other applicants in the region.

### **Question 1 Response**

The NorCal Continuum of Care is a seven-county CoC which covers the counties of Del Norte, Siskiyou, Modoc, Shasta, Lassen, Plumas and Sierra. For this Plan and Application, each County has designated the NorCal CoC to apply for HHAP-3 funds on its behalf through the joint application process. In addition, each County that is a member of the CoC has an Advisory Board which is made up of local government, homeless service providers, housing authorities and community agencies and partners in the fields of health, human services, law enforcement, education, disability rights, workforce development and domestic violence. Each County Advisory Board meets monthly and has a representative on the NorCal CoC Executive Committee. This extensive network and formalized structure means that each County is able to carry out its own coordination efforts with its county-level CoC partners, and the results of those coordination efforts are brought to the NorCal CoC through its Executive Committee. For this HHAP-3 Plan and Application, the Executive Committee has overseen its development with input from each County Advisory Board.

#### **Question 2 Response**

As mentioned in Question #1, each County that is a member of the NorCal CoC has its own Advisory Board which functions as a "mini CoC" in each County. These Advisory Boards include partner representatives from local health care and managed care plans, public health, behavioral health, social service, justice entities, people with lived experience, education, workforce development, etc. The HHAP-3 funds will be used to leverage funding available to or through these partnerships. Examples of funding that will be leveraged include but are not limited to:

• Housing and Homelessness Incentive Program (HHIP): incentive funds made available through DHCS to managed Medi-Cal plans who make investments and progress in addressing homelessness for members in their coverage areas. The NorCal CoC Counties are covered by three managed Medi-Cal plan providers as follows:

- o Partnership Health: Del Norte, Siskiyou, Modoc, Shasta, Lassen
- o Anthem Blue Cross: Plumas, Sierra
- o California Health & Wellness: Plumas, Sierra

The NorCal CoC and each member County are engaged in planning and data sharing with each managed Medi-Cal plan provider so that they may coordinate the following funding sources and activities to achieve mutual goals.

• No Place Like Home (NPLH): available to local Behavioral Health Departments in partnership with developers

• Bringing Families Home, Home Safe, CalWORKs Housing Support Program, Housing and Disability Advocacy Program: available to local Social Services Departments

- Whole Person Care, LICN Implementation Grants: available to local Public Health Departments
- The Housing Navigators Program and Transitional Housing Program: available for transition-age youth in foster care or probation systems
- Proposition 47 Funds: available to justice-involved homeless individuals with a mental illness

### Question 3

A description of specific actions the applicant will take to ensure racial and gender equity in service delivery, housing placements, and housing retention and changes to procurement or other means of affirming racial and ethnic groups that are overrepresented among residents experiencing homelessness have equitable access to housing and services.

#### **Question 3 Response**

The NorCal CoC proposes to develop a Taskforce which includes individuals with a lived experience of homelessness who are also members of racial and ethnic groups who are disproportionately affected by homelessness to develop county-level action plans which address racial and gender equity in service delivery, housing placements and housing retention.

### **Question 4**

A description of how the applicant will make progress in preventing exits to homelessness from institutional settings, including plans to leverage funding from mainstream systems for evidence-based housing and housing-based solutions to homelessness.

#### **Question 4 Response**

Each County within the NorCal CoC works with mainstream organizations in their community to address how to prevent exiting people from institutional settings into homelessness. Currently, a significant portion of funding through ESG and HHAP is used for rapid rehousing, which has been addressing much of this need. However, the number of available units in which to place individuals continues to decrease, due to a lack of rentals and affordable housing overall in the region. While motel stays are often the default option, they are expensive and do not address long-term housing stability. Given this, efforts will focus on the development of new supportive housing and shelter options, including non-congregate interim/transitional housing. The use of Homekey funding, leveraged by PLHA and HHAP to ensure that adequate supportive services are provided, is envisioned as one of the most significant sources of funding to address this need.

### **Question 5**

Specific and quantifiable systems improvements that the applicant will take to improve the delivery of housing and services to people experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness, including, but not limited to, the following:

(I) Capacity building and workforce development for service providers within the jurisdiction, including removing barriers to contracting with culturally specific service providers and building the capacity of providers to administer culturally specific services.

(II) Strengthening the data quality of the recipient's Homeless Management Information System.

(III) Increasing capacity for pooling and aligning housing and services funding from existing, mainstream, and new funding.

(IV) Improving homeless point-in-time counts.

(V) Improving coordinated entry systems to strengthen coordinated entry systems to eliminate racial bias, to create a youthspecific coordinated entry system or youth-specific coordinated entry access points, or to improve the coordinated entry assessment tool to ensure that it contemplates the specific needs of youth experiencing homelessness.

#### **Question 5 Response**

(I) Each County proposes to use Systems Support funding through HHAP-3 to contract with local service providers who understand and serve culturally specific populations, such as the Native American/Indigenous populations. The NorCal CoC region has a number of tribes and tribal organizations in particular that will be asked to contract to provide culturally appropriate training and services to staff and clients.

(II) The CoC's HMIS serves all seven counties that are members of the CoC. These are mostly rural and in many cases, very remote counties with few service providers. These factors have impacted thorough and consistent use of the HMIS system. The CoC will use a portion of the HHAP-3 funds to build infrastructure through software licensing, training and technical assistance to strengthen data quality. The goal will be to have 100% of providers who receive funding through the CoC utilizing HMIS by June 2024. (III) As part of the HHAP-3 planning process, the NorCal CoC contracted with a consultant who gathered county-level data on funding and housing efforts. We plan to continue this contract to further analyze how to best leverage and align funding to fill gaps in housing and services on a county-specific basis. This is important given the differences in staffing, resources and populations in each of the seven counties. (IV) The remote, rural and mountainous nature of the NorCal CoC region provides a number of challenges

to effective point-in-time counts. Given this we intend to jointly fund a position with the HHAP 3 grant at the lead agency level. The new position will be to provide extra support and training for the PIT/HIC Count. The position will help support all the agencies within the NorCal CoC to make the PIT/HIC count successful, as well as provide support to all agencies receiving HHAP 3 funds to help with HMIS and grant compliance for the life of the grant.

(V) The NorCal CoC has been working over the last several years to implement an effective Coordinated Entry System that makes sense for each County, given the differences in geography, staffing and community resources that impact how CES actually functions in a remote, rural area. Part of these efforts include bringing in community partners who work with racial or ethnic sub-groups and youth to include entry into CES as part of their regular intake, and therefore not requiring these individuals to jump through additional hoops or make additional trips to receive services and be prioritized for housing.

Explanation of How the Proposed Use of Funds Will Complement Existing local, state, and federal funds and equitably close the gaps identified in the Local Landscape Analysis

Our Continuum of Care consists of seven rural northern California counties. Each county has a different set of resources and needs to address homelessness. Each county has established an individual budget for HHAP-3 which reflects their intention of how they will use funds to address their needs and which support the Goals identified in Table 4. For some counties, this means funding a youth non-congregate shelter, and for others, it means providing rental subsidies until such time that new supportive housing units come on-line using HCD resources such as NPLH, MPH and HOME. The aggregate funding information from all seven counties is shown here. In addition, the counties and CoC have agreed to jointly fund projects which will serve the entire CoC membership and improve its homelessness housing delivery system infrastructure, such as funding for HMIS and a dedicated position at lead agency which will work the member counties on expanding the UT counts.

376 of the 689 shelter beds on the 2022 HIC report were listed as facility based beds. The remaining 313 beds were various voucher-based beds being provided. Typically, the voucher beds provided a hotel stay. Most of our facility-based shelters do not currently utilize HMIS so we have no data to show the exits or vacancy rates. Vacancy rates provided are based on contacting the shelters and completed an informal survey. The facility based beds listed in HIC are mostly religious based organizations and a large portion of our homeless population has no interest in interacting with the religious organizations.

Of the emergency Shelters in our HMIS system there were 584 clients served from 1/26/2021 to 1/25/2022 and as of 1/25/22 the night of the PIT 326 had been exited from the ES with 73 of those exits moving to a permanent housing situation. Most of these clients were served in programs where they were being provided a hotel stay and supportive services to help stabilize them and find housing.

The interim shelter that we would be funding with HHAP 3 will follow a similar model. Where clients will be provided with a hotel stay and a case manager typically a social worker. The case manager will help the client connect to any housing resources that are available and ensure that the clients have been entered into our coordinated entry system to get connected to a housing intervention as soon as possible. We also have a provider that will be looking at funding host homes for homeless youth and provided case management services to work on connecting the youth clients to a permanent housing solution.
