Overview of HCD's Role & Mission

HCD: California Department of Housing and Community Development

What we do:

- Increase the supply of affordable places to live in California
- Preserve affordable homes and protect public investment
- Protect mobilehome and manufactured homeowners



HCD: California Department of Housing and Community Development

 Guard health and safety for all Californians through Building Standards and Code Adoption

 Ensure California plans for range of housing that meets varied needs of Californians

 Create effective solutions to the housing crisis through policy and research

Accountability & Enforcement

- HCD enforces state housing laws to meaningfully and positively impact the provision of housing in all communities across the state.
- As part of the 2021-2022 state budget, the Housing Accountability Unit (HAU) was formed.
- While education and technical assistance is always the first step, the HAU holds jurisdictions accountable for meeting their housing element commitments and complying with state housing laws. Violations of these state laws may lead to consequences including revocation of housing element certification and/or referral to the California Office of the Attorney General.



Fair Housing Obligations

HCD's Fair Housing Obligations

 State and local governments that receive funding from HUD have a duty to Affirmatively Further Fair Housing (AFFH)

 Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing (AFFH) means taking meaningful actions, in addition to combating discrimination, that overcome patterns of segregation and foster inclusive communities free from barriers that restrict access to opportunity based on protected characteristics


Fair Housing Plan Overview

- 1. Process occurs every five years in connection with the development of the Consolidated Plan (ConPlan).
- 2. HCD is required to Affirmatively Further Fair Housing, completing a fair housing assessment is a part of our AFFH duty.
- 3. Requires engagement of stakeholders and public.
- 4. Must discuss and identify barriers to fair housing choice and issues impacting persons with protected characteristics.



Protected Characteristics – Federal

- Race
- Color
- Religion
- National origin
- Sex
- Familial status
- Disability (mental or physical)



Protected Characteristics – California



- Sexual orientation
- Gender identity
- Gender expression
- Gender
- Genetic information
- Marital status
- Military or veteran status
- Medical condition
- Ancestry

- Source of income (including the use of government rental assistance such as a Section 8 Housing Choice voucher)
- Citizenship
- Immigration status
- Primary language
- Age (over 40)


California's Housing Problem

California's housing crisis is a half century in the making. Decades of underproduction underscored by exclusionary policies have left housing supply far behind need and costs soaring.


As a result, millions of Californians, who are disproportionately lower income and people of color, must make hard decisions about paying for housing at the expense of food, health care, childcare, and transportation—one in three households in the state doesn't earn enough money to meet their basic needs.

Most Californians want the state to require localities to build their fair share of affordable housing

■ State should require localities to build their "fair share" ■ Localities should be able to decide housing policy





Annual Production of Housing Units 1960-2022




Extremely Low-Income Renter Households

- Renter households that are extremely low-income: 1,308,328 or 22%
- Shortage of rental homes affordable and available for extremely low-income renters: -988,510
- Annual household income needed to afford a twobedroom rental home at HUD's Fair Market Rent: \$87,877






Cost Burdened Renter Households by Race & Ethnicity



Fair Housing Complaints – CA Civil Right's Dept.




Immigration

 California is home to immigrant communities from over 60 different countries


 27% of Californians are foreign born

California has higher percentages of Latinos and Asians than the US as a whole





Homelessness Snapshot


Sheltered and Unsheltered Homeless Population





Total Homeless, 2023 181,399


Racial Disparities in Homelessness






California Homelessness Characteristics

In 2023 (data through June 2023) with California homelessness response system the 254,914 people experiencing homelessness reflected the following characteristics.



47% reported disabling condition(s) 118,908 of 254,914 people



21% reported having experienced **domestic violence** 41,392 of 198,605 people

7% identified as veterans 13,489 of 191,957 adults


