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Consolidated Plan Overview

To receive HUD funds, HCD must prepare and submit a five-year plan known as the Consolidated Plan (Con Plan).

- The State of California's Con Plan:
 - 1. Covers Fiscal Years 2025-2029. With a supplemental Annual Action Plan each program year.
 - 2. Examines the housing and community development needs of Californians and their communities.
 - 3. Lays out how federal funds will be used to address non-entitlement community needs and improve the quality of life for these communities.
 - 4. Is applicable mainly to "non-entitlement" areas that do not receive funds directly from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).





Programs Included in Consolidated Plan

- CDBG Community Development Block Grant
- ESG Emergency Solutions Grants
- ► HOME HOME Investment Partnerships Program
- ► HOPWA Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS
 - HOPWA is administered by CDPH
- NHTF National Housing Trust Fund or Housing Trust Fund



HCD uses the most current reports to:

- Illustrate housing trends
- Identify areas of need
- Clarify types of projects that could benefit from funding
- Using reliable sourced data sets provide the foundation for these analysis



Increases **transparency** and ensures that **no personal bias** was involved in our analysis



Assessing the Needs in the Communities

- Housing costs have increased over the past several years while income has not increased at the same speed
- Housing is experiencing at least one of four housing problems
 - Lack of complete kitchen
 - Incomplete plumbing
 - Overcrowded households
 - Cost-burdened households
- Community outreach indicated vulnerable populations
 - Seniors (including veterans)
 - Persons w/disabilities
 - Single parent families
 - persons coming from foster care, institutional settings or previously incarcerated
 - Rural residents are at risk (cheaper rent, but higher unemployment with lesser wages)



Analyzing Market Conditions

Market Analysis

Analysis of housing and economic market conditions that affect housing

- ☐ Discriminatory lending practices
- ☐ Access to opportunities (i.e., access to quality schools)
- ☐ Housing discrimination (i.e., marketing language)
- ☐ Land use policies and procedures (i.e., senior housing, emergency shelters)
- □ Not collaborating regionally (i.e., working with regional organizations to address issues such as homelessness within the City)



- Shortage of affordable housing has several longstanding issues:
 - High land prices.
 - Restrictive land use policies, lengthy development processes, and other legal barriers to new construction.
 - High development costs due to fees, construction requirements, and a shortage of construction labor.
 - Limited resources for developing or converting existing housing into subsidized units.
 - Insufficient infrastructure and public services to support housing, particularly in rural areas.
 - A lack of resources for households to modify existing homes to accommodate changing needs.
 - Community opposition to new development, especially affordable housing projects,
 - Disaster and climate change impacts and vulnerability.



- Income limitations
- High housing prices
- High cost-of-living
- Restrictions on housing program assistance
- Inability for applicants to meet housing program qualification requirements



Strategic Plan



Based on the identified needs and market conditions for the areas served by HCD's federal funding programs, the Strategic Plan identifies the priority needs and sets five-year goals based on anticipated resources.



Goals to Accomplish

Based on the priority needs, HCD has created eight goals to achieve over the five-year span:

- Increase Supply of Affordable Housing
 - Rental Units Constructed
 - New Owner-Occupied Units Constructed
- Preserve Existing Affordable Housing
 - Rental Units Rehabilitated
 - Homeowner Housing Units Rehabilitated
- Improve Access to Affordable Housing
 - Homebuyers assisted with downpayment assistance or similar assistance to achieve homeownership.
 - Renters provided with Tenant-Based Rental Assistance to stay stably housed.





Goals to Accomplish

4. Prevent Homelessness

 Households prevented from becoming homeless with rent, utility or other short term housing payment assistance

Address Homelessness

- Households rapidly rehoused
- Individuals staying in an emergency shelter per night
- Individuals reached by street outreach programs
- Housing Operations for special populations



- 6. Invest in Community and Public Infrastructure and Facilities
 - People served by new and improved Public Facility or Infrastructure Activities



Goals to Accomplish

- 7. Provide Community-Based Public Services
 - People served by Public Service Activities
- 8. Increase Economic Development Opportunities
 - Jobs Created/Retained
 - Businesses Assisted





2025-2026 Annual Action Plan

- Provides a road map for the first year of implementation of the five-year Consolidated Plan. It includes estimated annual allocations and describes the method of distribution for each funded program.
- The Annual Action Plan is updated yearly with newly allocated amounts and includes a public hearing.
- Be sure to speak-out each year!
